The Good News About Giving

Resurrection Family,

I know we're all coming to the conversation about giving from many different places and histories. Some of you may have been hurt by heavy-handed church leaders using guilt and shame. Others have hurtful experiences from churches that suggest prosperity will result from your giving. Some folks are new to the idea of giving to the church and wanting to learn more, and others have found a healthy way to give as an expression of faith and joy.

Wherever you find yourself in this journey, I think it's important we start with the good news about who God is: God is loving, self-giving, joyful, patient, abundant, kind, and generous. We see God clearly in the Son, Jesus Christ, whose example reveals the good news giving:

True generosity comes from grateful hearts.

This short booklet guides your journey of discernment, prayer, and growth. We realize this can be a tricky topic, with lots of questions, challenges, and even anxieties. I hope we can help resolve some of these to make way for a new chapter in your spiritual life marked by the generosity of God. May you feel freedom as a result of this journey and be filled with hope for the future and excitement to join in the work of God for the sake of others.

Hear the Good News

Reflect on this teaching from Jesus and notice what speaks to your heart.

‘Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal, but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal.

For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also...

No one can serve two masters, for a slave will either hate the one and love the other or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth.

Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?...

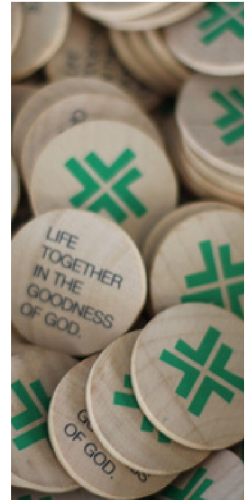
What is Giving?

Giving is not an answer to scarcity

We're not raising money to fund a church budget, we're raising disciples to participate in the work of God. People are not "resources" to be tapped for more, we are disciples being formed into Christlikeness. Giving is also not an answer to the sense of scarcity that we may have in our hearts or this world, it is the grateful response of a people who have received a great gift.

Giving is an act of worship

In the liturgy, there is an excellent picture of how our giving is a joyful part of our worship life as a church. It's called the offertory, where our gifts are brought forward in response to the lavish generosity of God by the gift of His son, Jesus Christ. As recipients of this gift, we sing "Praise God from whom all blessings flow!" and offer ourselves as living sacrifices—all of us—given back to the Lord with gratitude. Those who give online take a token at the welcome table to put in the offering basket to remember that giving is an act of worship.



Giving is a part of discipleship

Our acts of generosity are part of following Jesus. He invites us to take on his manner of life, and his way of doing things. We find that in Jesus' company, our hearts are being changed to become more like his and we participate in God's work in the world.

Giving is a journey

It's part of the journey of transformation we're all on together. We never talk about it with pressure or guilt, but always open up space for you to find out for yourself what it is that God is inviting you to do, and then to respond with the support of a community. Generosity involves an intentional growing process.

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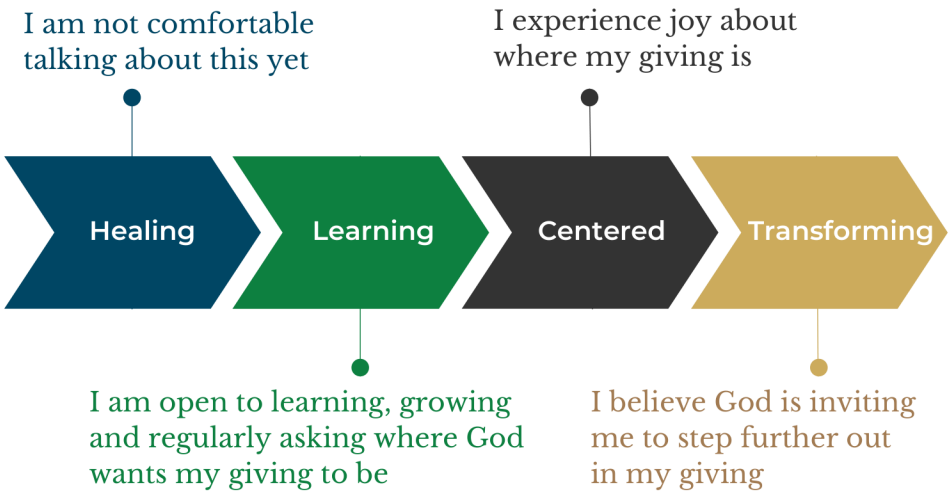

Growing in Generosity

Generosity is a way in which we participate in and with God. As we give of ourselves, we become part of God’s generous giving to the world.

Use this as a guide to consider where God wants you to be in your giving.



How you can use this guide:

- Consider the above and ask yourself, “What would my next step look like in this growing process of generosity?”
- If you’re ready to consider that, there is a gentle guide to use on the following page.
- We suggest taking time to work through it and pray. If you have a partner, we invite you to do it together.
- This is work for you to keep as you discern God’s invitation in your life.

A gentle way to discern your growth

1. Which of these spaces do you find yourself in today when it comes to your giving?

2. Considering where you are at with generosity, in what ways would you be open to growing?

3. Ask, “God, where do you want me in my giving?” and listen in prayer. Write out what you think might be God’s invitation.

5. Write a prayer: “God, I know that you love me and care for my needs. In your mercy, receive my concerns about...

6. What are some ways I could use some understanding, support, or care from our church?

God, where do you want me to be in my giving?

As you discern this question, considering these ways you might take some next steps in growth.

PLAN

What ways could I plan my giving? It could be setting up recurring online giving, finding areas to reduce expenses to make space, or committing to praying about your needs.

PRIORITIZE

What ways could I make giving a higher priority in my life? It could be by giving first, committing to more regularly attending church on Sundays, or denying yourself something in favor of giving.

PERCENTAGE

What percentage of my income do I sense that God is inviting me to give?

PROGRESS

In what other ways might God be inviting me to grow in my generosity? It could be by increasing how much I gave last year, practicing hospitality, or serving others.

Pledging at Resurrection

At Resurrection, pledging is the result of careful discernment, prayer, and planning. We want our people to be able to express what they sense God inviting them to do with their giving in the next year. These commitments are confidential to the vestry and administrator.
